

"Have you seen a symphony orchestra? They are dolled up and beautiful with their magnificent instruments, cellos, violins etc. Sometimes dolled up as the rest, is a chap at the back carrying a triangle. Now and again the conductor will point to him and he will play a 'ting'. That might seem so insignificant, but in the conception of the composer, something irreplaceable would be lost to the total beauty of the symphony if that 'ting' did not happen."

Thanks and praise, in all our situations.

"Now thank we all our God, with hearts and hands and voices, Who wondrous things hath done, in whom His world rejoices; Who from our mother's arms hath blessed us on our way With countless gifts of love, and still is ours today."

This well known, and much loved hymn was written in 1636 by Martin Rinkart, a Lutheran pastor from Eilenburg, Germany. He was born in 1586 in Eilenburg, the son of a coppersmith and studied theology in Leipzig in the early 1600s. In 1617 he became Archdeacon in Eilenburg and the following year the Thirty Years War broke out. This war was a continuation of wars fought over the Reformation in the early 1500s. Eilenburg was particularly hard hit, refugees were streaming in by the thousands. Not only did they have to contend with the war, but also famines and plagues. Misery and death were ever present. It's estimated that he was performing over 4,000 funerals per year, including that of his wife in May, 1637.

Rinkart was giving all he could (food, money, clothing) to the refugees and the poor in his community, keeping just enough to sustain himself and his family. Two thirds of the way through this war, amidst all of the death, suffering, and disease, Rinkart's faith was so strong that he was able to write "Now thank we all our God." Although originally used as a prayer prior to meals, this hymn became one of the most popular in Germany and is still sung at most celebratory services and at times of thanksgiving.

"O may this bounteous God through all our life be near us, With ever joyful hearts and blessed peace to cheer us; And keep us still in grace, and guide us when perplexed, And free us from all ills, in this world and the next."

May we be like Martin Rinkhart and be able to pray such uplifting words as that hymn when we are faced with dark times.

I was sifting through old emails recently and came across this contained in one from my cousin in America. As a message about God's love, I thought it would be nice to share it in our magazine?

When my now-grown-up son, Xavier, was in kindergarten, he stretched his arms wide and said, "I love you *this* much." I stretched my longer arms wide and said, "I love you *this* much." Planting his fists on his hips, he said, "I loved you first." I shook my head. "I loved you when God first put you in my womb." Xavier's eyes widened. "You win." "We both win," I said, "because Jesus loved both of us first."

As Xavier prepares for the birth of his first child, I'm praying he'll enjoy trying to out-love his son as they make sweet memories. But as I prepare to be a grandmother, I'm amazed at how much I loved my grandson from the moment Xavier and his wife told us they were expecting a baby.

The apostle John affirmed that Jesus' love for us gives us the ability to love Him and others (1 John 4:19). The Seven Deadly Sins

Sin separates us from God. Does God consider all sins to be equal, or are some sins considered more serious than others? Every Christian will have heard of 'the seven deadly sins,' also referred to as cardinal sins, so perhaps God does consider some sins to be more serious than others. Curiously, however, there is no mention of the 'seven deadly sins' in the Bible, so where did they arise from?

The story begins with a Monk called Evagrius Ponticus born in modern day Turkey. He was well educated and a prolific writer on matters of religion. He was living in Egypt around 375 AD when he listed 487 'temptations' to which we humans are exposed to. He categorised these into eight 'patterns of evil,' namely: gluttony, lust, greed, anger, pride, boastfulness, sadness, and despondency. In 590 AD Pope Gregory the First reviewed the list. He combined 'despondency' and 'sadness' into 'sloth.' He also included 'boastfulness' with 'pride', and added 'envy' as a separate category. Gregory listed these seven (deadly) sins in order of increasing severity as: lust, gluttony, greed, sloth, wrath, envy, and pride. Gregory stated that pride was the most serious sin because it led people to commit many other sins. Incidentally, Gregory is also credited with devising the 'seven heavenly virtues' namely: prudence, justice, temperance, courage, faith, hope and charity.

The seven deadly sins are considered the worst of traits, affecting how people treat their own bodies and how they interact with other people. Although the 'seven deadly sins' are not specifically referred to in the Bible, each sin is mentioned individually in various parts of the text (for example, see Galatians 5:19-21). The seven sins listed resonate with the Ten Commandments, issued around 1450 BC. For example, 'You shall not commit adultery' fits nicely with the sin of lust, and 'You shall not covet your neighbour's house or anything that belongs to your neighbour' fits with the sins of greed and envy.

We all suffer from human failings and it can be easy to commit a sin, even inadvertently. On those occasions when we do transgress, we should seek God's forgiveness, for the Bible tells us that there is no sin too great for God to forgive, provided we are contrite and genuinely wish to repent. Evagrius argued that prayer seeking forgiveness must be accompanied with tears if the supplicant is truly repentant. But, was he talking about his list of eight 'patterns of evil,' or of any sin?
